

## Primary 1

### English

- Continue to develop fine motor skills through cutting and pre-writing activities.
- Practise the correct pencil grip.
- Begin to recognise single sounds through stories and songs.
- Listen to stories and follow instructions.
- Develop confidence talking in small groups and to the whole class.

### Physical Education

- This term we will play Hockey and Basketball, and develop our understanding of Respect and Tolerance through this.

### Art

- In Art we are learning how to cut, rip, arrange and stick different materials to create a collage.

### Music

- We will be exploring a wide range of music through the Jolly Music programme.

### Mathematics

- Counting forwards and backwards within 10.
- Learn to recognise the number 0-10 (and beyond).
- Correctly sequence numbers to 10 starting from smallest or largest.
- Practise counting a collection of objects.
- Learn to associate numbers with regular patterns e.g. dice/dominoes.
- Recognise, describe and sort common 2D shapes and 3D objects.

### IDL

Our topic **Me and my school** will explore ourselves, our diversity and our school environment -

1. What makes me, me?
2. Making new friendships and relationships within the school.
3. Our local area of Sound.
4. Listening to stories about being ourselves, celebrating our uniqueness.

Our school focus values this term are 'happiness' and 'determination'.

### Continuous Provision

- Our learning space provides learners with the opportunity to explore the curricular outcomes through their play.
- We will explore the outdoor spaces too.
- We love loose parts and can use them in a variety of ways e.g. in our café as pretend food or money, for counting/sorting/pattern making in numeracy or even to create roads, houses in imaginary play – their use is infinite. Donations of loose parts or junk modelling always welcome.
