

Objectives

- To explore the feelings of story characters and suggest solutions to their problems
- To write a letter using key information from the story


Resources

- A Squash and a Squeeze by Julia Donaldson and Axel Scheffler
- Resource Sheet 1: Dear little old lady...
- Resource Sheet 2: An invitation

Age 5-7 Home Learning

Outcomes

- Children will write a letter of apology, requesting a visit to the little old lady's house
- Children will write a reply to the letter in the form of an invitation



Introduction

After sharing the story with your child, revisit the last page in the book. How do the animals seem to be feeling? Why are they looking so sad? Revisit the pages where the animals look happy and content. Ask your child to suggest ways in which the animals could be cheered up.

Main task

Ask your child to imagine that they are one of the animals in the story and that they are going to write a letter to the little old lady, starting with an apology for any breakages or mess they may have caused. They will then make a request, such as to come and visit the little old lady, with a promise that they will behave well. You may wish to show your child some real letters and provide them with some letter-writing language to emphasise the correct format before asking them to write their letter using *Resource Sheet 1: Dear little old lady....*

Extension

Using *Resource Sheet 2: An invitation*, your child could write an invitation from the little old lady back to the animals, inviting them for afternoon tea. The invitation may include instructions like 'as long as you don't break my table' or 'as long as you don't ruin the curtains'.

Curriculum links

Reading

- Write sentences by:
 - Saying out loud what they are going to write about.
 - Composing a sentence orally before writing.
 - Sequencing sentences to form short narratives.
 - o Re-reading what they have written to check that it makes sense.
- Discuss what they have written with the teacher or other pupils.
- Read aloud their writing clearly enough to be heard by their peers and the teacher.
