Some Tips to help keep you child safe whilst gaming online -

- Teach your child basic internet safety. Have an open dialog with the young person so that they know they can come to you for help if they are worried about anything that has happened online or are concerned about other peoples online behaviours. Use the resources below for internet safety advice.
- Involve yourself with your child's game. This can be difficult but if done can help teach younger children how to deal with others online, as not everyone can be nice.
- Set rules and discuss online behaviours such as limiting playing time, having manners and using appropriate language and not sharing personal information about themselves or others with strangers.

Gaming for young children

How can I make sure my child's games are appropriate for them?

Use 'airplane' mode settings on your tablet or smartphone. That way, they can play
offline without making accidental purchases or connecting with someone they
don't know. Use PEGI ratings and App store ratings to ensure your children are
playing age-appropriate game.
