




Performance Data (Literacy and Numeracy Stage147) - Excellence Over Time Charts 2016/17-2023/24





Performance Data (Literacy and Numeracy Stage 147) - Equity (Local) Over Time Charts

## Crawforddyke Primary School Overview

Crawforddyke Primary School is located within the semi-rural area of Clydesdale. The school role in session 24/25 is 411 over 15 classes. We also have a mobile teaching unit which is used to facilitate parent workshops, pupil groups and Nurture. Our catchment area is a mixture of social and privately-owned homes. Our teaching staff entitlement includes a Senior Leadership team consisting of the Head Teacher, 2 Depute Heads and a Principal Teacher.

In Crawforddyke Primary, our vision was created following a consultation process with all stakeholders. It states that "we want all our learners to be safe and happy while believing that with practise, perseverance and effort they can achieve, learn and grow". We have worked hard to develop a belief in 'growth mind-set' and how a positive approach to learning can help all our pupils to be the best they can be. Our core values were chosen alongside our vision statement: to be kind, caring and respectful to others, while demonstrating self-confidence, determination, and courage.



Our school badge includes the phrase 'Be Diligent', deriving from the Latin 'diligere' – to value or respect. Following a review of our Curriculum Rationale in 2024/2025, all stakeholders agreed that our school motto should be 'Growing Minds, Nurturing Hearts', identifying our aim to ensure all learners are safe, happy and learning.

Our school mascot is 'Mossy the Mindset Monster', who was created in 2018 when all pupils wrote a published book all about Growth Mindset. He is a much-loved character and has become a key feature across the school!



Sports play a significant role in our school. We have received 6 Sporting School of the Year awards in recognition of our commitment towards sport and fitness across the whole school. We have achieved our Gold Award for Sporting Schools.

In November 2022, we were awarded the National Nurturing Schools Award by Nurture UK, recognising the whole school commitment to nurturing practice and the promotion of health and wellbeing for all. We have an established Nurture space, which is accessed by pupils when they require additional support throughout the year.

We have worked to promote reading for enjoyment across our school and Learning Community. In October 2022 we were awarded the Gold Reading Schools Award, recognising our commitment to encourage and facilitate reading by pupils, parents and all stakeholders.

We have unique outdoor learning facilities, allowing us to deliver extensive outdoor learning opportunities across all primary classrooms. In September 2022, we received our 8<sup>th</sup> Eco Green Flag, recognising the excellent work we do to promote sustainability across our school and community. Our school grounds accommodate a range of wildflower gardens, vegetable plots, bug houses and bird boxes. In September 2022, we installed a large polytunnel in which we grow a mixture of fruits and vegetables. In May 2023, we were awarded Climate Action Project of the Year Award by Keep Scotland Beautiful, recognising or whole school approach to sustainability and tackling climate change.

We have an active Parent Council who play an integral role in the life of the school. Our Parent Forum is extremely supportive, and we have many parent helpers supporting classrooms. The Parent Council raises significant funds, all of which are used to benefit the pupils in the school. We have good links with the local community, including Tesco, the local Ranger service and St. John's Church.

We are part of the Carluke Learning Community and have developed strong links with Kirkstyle ELC, all local primary schools and Carluke High School, to ensure smooth transitions are planned for.
