Our Progress and Impact in 2024/2025



Nurture

25 learners have directly benefited from our Nurture provision. Achieved four Attachment Informed Accreditation pledges.

As a result of our Nurture conference, Ambassadors were invited to present at Hear Your Voice SLC conference.

Hosted two more ELC PEEP programmes with 11 nursery families being involved resulting in a strong attachment to our families

Further increased our family learning opportunities through numerous learning workshops and You+Me. Two more workshops were delivered by Ed Psych.

Relationships policy has been fully implemented after consultation with our school community.

99% of our learners told us they feel nurtured

Next Steps for Nurture

We have increased the opportunities for learners to lead their own learning.

Inquiry based learning

All classes undertook an inquiry based sustainability project related to Global Goals and presented their findings.

Joint training was provided for all staff in play and inquiry approach. Opportunities were provided for additional professional dialogue.

We hosted our first Wonder Day and piloted our inquiry approach.

We created a KPS inquiry model framework using the 3 key wonder questions from our ELC.

Collegiate work took place with Peer School sharing practices on provocations and play.

Diversity

Assemblies have an equalities focus. P6 provide a weekly input of British Sign Language.

We have a Culture Club HEART group who have created multilingual signage across the school.

Every class has a Being Me Wall. As a result learners report they love having a representation of themselves and feel celebrated.

All staff have undergone training in Time for Inclusive Education. and Anti-Racism.

A new and diverse reading scheme at P1 has been purchased & implemented

P7s participated in Extraordinary Transition project developing literacy skills.

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Education Scotland Visit

Education Scotland inspected Kirktonholme Primary and Nursery Class in October 2024. They found the following strengths in our school and nursery's work.





The very effective strategic leadership of the headteacher who empowers children and teachers to lead change across the school. This results in positive outcomes and experiences for children.






























The highly inclusive learning environments that staff create in the school and nursery. This supports children well to be respectful, supportive and motivated learners who are very proud of their school and nursery.

The sustained high levels of children's attainment and achievement. Senior leaders and staff have a clear strategy in place to raise children's attainment further.



Excellence and Equity in 2024/2025



Pupil Equity Funding

In 2024/2025, KPS was allocated £63,700 in Pupil Equity Funding. This budget is to reduce the poverty related attainment gap. KPS had 59 targeted learners in 2024/2025.

Participatory Budget Funding

Our Pupil Council HEART group led a consultation in how this money should be spent. It was voted upon by our whole school community. It was decided to be spent on DIGITAL EQUIPMENT.

An additional 10 Chromebooks and 4 CTouches were purchased along with Clickview subscription. In 2024/2025, 15% of Pupil Equity Funding was spent through Participatory Budget.

Closing the literacy gap

This year we have targeted the literacy gap by

- Additional staff training on reading
- Purchase and pilot a new reading scheme at P1 to support early blending work
- Full implementation of NELI small group intervention at P1
- P7 Learning Buddies
- Reading School Project

Attendance Project

We have continued with our impactful family engagement and robust procedures to maintain attendance rates. Our practice has been shared locally and nationally.

Nurture

Our evidence from self-evaluation told us that our children needed wellbeing supports. This resulted in setting up a new nurture provision. Last session funding was used to provide a teacher for 2 days a week. This year we provided 3 semi classic nurture sessions for identified children. Another 15 learners benefited from additional emotion coaching groups. Boxall assessments have shown improvement for all children.

Closing the numeracy gap

This year we provided maths after school clubs for targeted learners as well as using IDL Numeracy. Early evaluations told us that the IDL Numeracy was not making an impact. Attendance was a barrier at the after-school clubs. 10 parents engaged with You + Me parent training and they rated it very highly.

Next Steps

Our data is telling us that the attainment gap has not reduced in literacy or numeracy. Therefore, all staff will continue to have a sharpened focus on how to reduce this. Our community tells us that the Nurture provision has been 'life changing' and should continue. This can take a greater length of time before we see impact on attainment. Our learners are telling us to use the funding to further enhance our ICT provision and we will utilise training to help us use digital effectively to ensure high quality teaching and learning.
