Attendance at school

It is important for the school to work with parents in encouraging all children to attend school. All absences from school are required by law to be recorded. Absences will normally fall under two categories – authorised or unauthorised absence. In cases where your child is unable to attend school, parents are asked to follow these guidelines:-

- If you know in advance of any reason why your child is likely to be absent from school, please
 tell someone at the school, phone us or let us know in writing. Please also give your child a
 note on his/her return to school, telling of the reason for absence (this can also be emailed).
- Notify the school first thing in the morning (before 9.15am) when your child is going to be absent. Let the school know the likely date of return and keep them informed if the date changes; inform the school of any change to the following:-
 - **Home** phone number
 - Mobile number
 - Emergency contact details

3. Parental involvement

Home school links

5. The Curriculum

Curriculum for Excellence is the name given to the new curriculum in Scotland for all children young people aged 3-18. It is a forward-looking, coherent, more flexible and enriched curriculum that provides young people with opportunities to engage with the knowledge, skills and attributes needed if they are to flourish in life, learning and work, now and in the future.

The curriculum includes all of the experiences that are planned for children and young people to support the development of their skills, wherever they are being educated, for example in the family and community, pre-school centre, nursery and school. This broad, general education will allow them to become successful learners, confident individuals, responsible citizens and effective contributors to life in the 21st century.

In taking this forward our school will work closely with South Lanarkshire Education Resources and other services to enrich the curriculum, to provide the best possible education for all children and young people. We wish you to feel confident that your child is encouraged and supported to develop their literacy, numeracy and other skills whilst they attend our school. The curricular areas are as follows:

What are the purposes of education in Scotland?

The ambition of a Curriculum for Excellence is that all children and every young person will become:

- · Successful learners
- · Confident individuals
- · Responsible citizens
- · Effective contributors

The 21st century curriculum will provide support, structure and direction to young people's learning so that they can maximise their potential in each of these four areas.

Sometimes the learning experiences may be linked together through themes and projects covering several areas of the curriculum (inter-disciplinary learning). At other times learning will take place in individual subject areas. Learning will also be developed through day to day involvement in the life and work of the school community and the wider community. Such activities will include a variety of out of school projects and a range of school or community-based events. Planned experiences will be designed to achieve specific outcomes in terms of the knowledge, skills and understanding that show how young people are progressing and developing.

What will this look like in practice?

When planning activities and experiences for young people, teachers will take account of the following seven principles:

- **1. Challenge and enjoyment -** All young people should be active in their learning and have opportunities to develop and demonstrate their creativity.
- **2. Breadth -** All young people should have access to a broad range of activities so that they can learn and develop in a variety of ways.
- 3. Progression All young people's learning should build on earlier knowledge and achievement.
- **4. Depth -** All young people should have opportunities to learn and study, in depth. As they progress, they should be able to draw different strands of learning together and deepen their learning to the best of their ability.
- **5. Personalisation and choice -** The individual needs of all young people should be recognised, and particular talents and skills supported and developed.

Opportunities should be provided for young people to exercise responsible personal choice as they progress through the school.

6. Coherence - There should be clear links between the different aspects of learning.

7. Relevance - Young people should understand the purpose of their activities and see the value of what they are learning for their present and future life.

Health and Wellbeing, Relationships, Sexual Health and Parenthood strand (RSHP)

Our local authority is committed to the provision of quality sex education in accordance with National Guidelines. It forms a key element of personal, social and health education in schools and is an important part of children's preparations for adult life. The purpose of RSHP work is to provide knowledge and understanding of the nature of sexuality and the processes of human reproduction within the context of relationships based on love and respect. All parents have the right to withdraw their children from RSHP lessons. Please notify the school in writing. If you wish to view the materials please contact the school.

The RSHP programme for the pupils will comprise:

Early years of primary school

- Awareness of the way bodies grow and change
- Uniqueness of their body
- Where living things come from
- · Family and special people who care for them

Middle stages

- Exploring changes in the body
- How human life begins
- Being part of a family
- Dealing with bullying situations

Upper stages

- Physical and Emotional changes at puberty
- Body image and self-worth
- Understanding of own developing sexuality
- Developing an awareness of gender identity
- Changing nature of friendship
- Dealing with sexual feelings
- Menstruation, pregnancy and birth

Modern foreign language

P1-7 will receive tuition in French.

ICT

We have 5 networked desktops, 2 laptops, 10 kindles, 15 Chromebooks and 20 IPads. ICT permeates all areas of the curriculum and brings the outside world into our classrooms. Coding resources have also been enhanced this year as part of our technology development.

Musical tuition

After school clubs

We offer after school clubs in partnership with outside agencies as well as clubs run by staff, parents and wider community links. Pupils have experienced a wide range of activities. Such as; Willow workshops, animation workshops, outdoor learning skills through Forest School approach, Scottish Opera workshops and much more. Pupils are also leading a variety of lunchtime clubs and enhancing their leadership skills.



Transition to Biggar High School

Transition opportunities with Biggar High School are strong. We also have an excellent transition programme involving all small schools within Biggar Learning Community. Residential experiences are provided for P6 and 7 in partnership with all small schools within Biggar Learning Community. These take place every 2 years normally.

Nursery- P1 Transition

We also have an established nursery – P1 transition. We have an existing transition programme for this but are continually developing and exploring more opportunities for pre-school to P1 collaboration.

Pre-school children are welcomed at every available opportunity to ensure smooth transition where ever possible. New Primary 1 parents have an opportunity to have informal discussions with staff prior to their children starting and pupils can participate in classroom activities when they visit.

PE kit

Children will take part in, at least, 2hrs of quality PE each week. We request that children wear suitable clothing and remove items of jewellery prior to PE participation, in accordance with SLC guidance. We hope this will avoid accidents and the loss of personal items.

Clothing / Outdoor clothing

Please ensure all items are marked with your child's name to ensure its safe return if misplaced.

Lost property

Please check our lost property box when things go missing or ask at the school office.

Class groupings

Learning and teaching activities will be organised in many ways. At different times during the school day, a child may work as part of a small group, as part of a class, individually with the teacher or independently. At times, a child or group of children may join others from another class for collaborative activities.

Homework

Homework is set on a regular basis from P1 onwards. Class teachers will inform you what homework will be set each night/ for the week via the homework diaries.

Water Bottles

Children are encouraged to have water (**juice is not permitted**) within class and throughout their school day. Pupils are required to bring their own water bottle to enable them to access this within school.

Spiritual, social, moral and cultural values (religious observance)

At Leadhills Primary School we aim to create an environment where our pupils appreciate values such as honesty, liberty, justice, fairness and concern for others. The children will be encouraged to develop a respect for other peoples' ideas, values, customs and beliefs, both within their community and the wider world.

Although we do not have a church within the village, Rev. Dr Nikki Macdonald visits the school regularly to share assemblies or the wider achievements within the school and local community.

This policy is based on the national guidance issued by the Scottish Government on 21st February 2011, and the Education (Scotland) Act 1980.

INFORMATION POINT: Parents may request that their children be permitted to be absent in order to celebrate recognised religious events. Advance notice should be provided to the school when children will be absent. Appropriate requests will be granted, and the pupil noted as an authorised absentee in the register.

Rights of parents / carers

Scottish Government Ministers consider that religious observance complements religious education and is an important contribution to pupils' development. It should also have a role in promoting the ethos of a school by bringing pupils together and creating a sense of community.

There is a statutory provision for parents to withdraw children from participation in religious observance. This right of parents' wishes will be respected. Where a child is withdrawn from religious observance, schools will make suitable arrangements for the child to participate in a worthwhile alternative activity.

Equalities

Integral to this guidance is the principle of mutual respect. The diversity of belief and tradition provides an ideal context in which pupils can learn about, and so learn from, what is important in the lives of themselves and others. South Lanarkshire's guidance recognises and welcomes diversity and promotes respectful understanding.

6. Assessment and tracking progress

Assessment can be formative and summative. Formative assessment is continuously being made to determine the effectiveness of teaching and to enable the teacher to plan the next steps for each child. Individual progress of pupils is tracked throughout the session and their school career. Standardised summative tests are used annually to check progress.

Final reports are sent home in June. The following information explains the terminology used within the report to track progress. **Literacy, Numeracy** and aspects of **Health and Wellbeing** will feature across learning and are the responsibility of all practitioners. Therefore, these areas have been given increased emphasis within the South Lanarkshire Council primary report. Information below shows how the curriculum levels are organised.

Level Stage covering 3 years approx.

Early The pre-school years and P1, or later for some.

First To the end of P4, but earlier or later for some.

Second To the end of P7, but earlier or later for some.

Third and Fourth S1 to S3, but earlier for some.

The fourth level broadly equates to Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework level 4. The fourth level experiences and outcomes are intended to provide possibilities for choice and young people's programmes will not include all of the fourth level outcomes.



Senior phase S4 to S6, and college or other means of study.

Some children and young people will start learning at these levels earlier and others later, depending upon individual needs and abilities. Learning progress is not about how fast children move through the levels but about 'how much' and 'how well' children learn, having depth and breadth of experiences at each level.

Important themes such as *enterprise*, *citizenship*, *sustainable development* and *creativity* are also included. Curriculum for Excellence is about raising standards, improving knowledge and developing skills. The curriculum ensures continuity in children's learning and will take account of their strengths, interests and achievements.

7. Reporting

Leadhills Primary School recognises that good teamwork among parents, children and schools is the key to a successful education for your child. Reporting will be ongoing and comprise a range of activities which can include children presenting their learning, newsletters, and ongoing oral discussions. Pupil learning journeys are updated regularly and shared with parents through their SWAY document.

We will provide parents with reports so that they can see what their child is doing and how they are

progressing. In addition, there will be parents' meetings which offer you the opportunity to discuss how your child is progressing and how you can contact the school if you wish further information. The school will offer you an appointment time so that you can visit in person to discuss your child's education.



Our 'learner reports' will help you to get to know more about the curriculum which each child follows and will describe their strengths, achievements and areas for development, so you know what encouragement and support you can give. We welcome any comments or additional information from parents to help us provide the best possible education for your child.

8. Transitions (Change of School / Placing Request)

Pupils normally transfer from primary to secondary school between the ages of 11½ and 12½, so that they will have the opportunity to complete at least 4 years of secondary education. Arrangements are made by the school to transfer children to the associated secondary school as determined by their home address. Parents of P7 children will be informed of the transfer arrangements made for their child to attend secondary school.

We will also provide you with information at this time on events designed to support P7 children before they move on to secondary school.

Change of School / Placing Request

Normally children attend the school in their catchment area. However, there are times when parents may wish their children to go to other schools. If you wish your child to go to another school, then you may make what is known as a 'placing request'. If you live in South Lanarkshire and decide to submit a 'placing request', we are unable to reserve a place in your catchment school until the Council has decided on the 'placing request'.

Please note if your 'placing request' application is unsuccessful and all places at your catchment school are filled you will be offered a place at the next nearest appropriate South Lanarkshire School.

INFORMATION POINT: Please note that if an application for a 'placing request' is successful then school transport is not provided. If you require further information, please contact **Education Support Services on 0303 123 1023.**

If you move out with your catchment school, a 'request to remain form' must be completed. If you move out with your catchment primary, this may affect your right to transfer to the associated secondary school. Please note the secondary school is determined by the pupil's permanent home address and chosen denomination. If you require further information, please contact Education Support Services on <a href="mailto:education-education

9. Support for pupils

Getting it right for every child, (GIRFEC)

Getting it right for every child (GIRFEC) supports families by making sure children and young people can receive the right help, at the right time, from the right people. The aim is to help them to grow up feeling loved, safe and respected so that they can realise their full potential.

Most children and young people get all the help and support they need from their parent(s), wider family and community but sometimes, perhaps unexpectedly, they may need a bit of extra help. GIRFEC is a way for families to work in partnership with people who can support them, such as teachers.

If you have any concerns about your child's wellbeing, you can speak to the named person who will work with you to provide support and decide how to move forward. Your school will let you know who this is. It is likely to be the Head Teacher in a primary school and a principal teacher (pupil support) in Secondary.

Support for all (Additional Support Needs)

All children have the right to access a quality educational provision and at Leadhills Primary School we endeavour to enable all pupils to reach their full potential. We believe that quality provision should operate within a framework of a positive ethos with an effective partnership between school, parents and other support services. The Head Teacher works closely with class teachers to identify pupils who are having trouble or who are making exceptionally good progress.

Pupils who require additional support will be supported in a positive and inclusive manner. We can, as appropriate, consult with our Educational Psychologist and Clydesdale Specialist Support Team for additional support, resources and guidance. South Lanarkshire Education Resources have published a series of leaflets available which cover information for parents and carers about the Additional Support for Learning Acts. Attachment Strategy for Education Resources

Attachment – what we do to support children and young people

South Lanarkshire Council Education Resources is committed to improving outcomes for children and young people by creating emotionally supportive learning experiences in our nurseries and schools.

The Education Resources Attachment Strategy supports the action in the 'Getting it Right for Every Child in South Lanarkshire's Children Services Plan 2021-23', following the launch of the Attachment Strategy in 2020, to provide staff training in Attachment and Trauma based practice.

What does it set out to do?

The aim of the strategy is to promote better experiences of attachment for South Lanarkshire's children and young people and to ensure that all education practitioners understand the importance of attachment theory, and its application, and how positive relationships can make a difference to outcomes.

How can I find out more?

South Lanarkshire Council Education Resources have published a series of leaflets and posters for establishments and for parents/carers, which aim to share information on attachment theory and on how this informs the ways in which we support children and young people.

10. School improvement - School Improvement Plan 2022-2023

SLC Priority for 2022-2023 and beyond:

- We will use Talk for writing methodology to guide the teaching and planning, tracking and monitoring, and evaluation of writing, across P1-7 to support raising standards in literacy.
- Whole staff introduction/refresher to Talk for Writing methodology, including shadowing of other staff out-with the school to support the raising of standards in literacy.
- Clear guidance for the teaching of writing, linked to Talk for writing methodology to ensure consistency of approach and improve standards.
- Moderation of writing to be robust and regular within Leadhills Primary, and across cluster schools, linked to moderation/ assessment calendar to support the improvement of literacy standards.
- Whole school talk for writing overview to support the provision of a rich and stimulating writing curriculum.

Provide a rich and stimulating curriculum that helps raise standards in literacy and numeracy. (Reading)

- Our aim is to achieve Reading School Bronze Award by June 2023 to support and foster an improved reading culture within Leadhills PS.

- > Consult pupils with regards to their preferred reading genre
- Creation of a lending library serving the community and school
- > Promote books through recommended reads
- Creation of a reading committee and junior librarians
- Improved use of outdoor spaces to support and develop enjoyment of reading

11. School policies and practical information

Healthy eating is something that the school supports and a range of meals is available at lunchtime that Nutritional Requirements for Food and Drink in Schools (Scotland) Regulations 2020

All primary aged pupils are also offered a free breakfast within their school. The selection available includes cereal, toast, fruit and milk.

For their lunch each day pupils have the option to choose from two hot meal options, a snack option plus a vegan / vegetarian option. These are all served with vegetables or side salad. All **meals** also come with fresh chilled drinking water, salad, and seasonal fruit and depending on the day - soup or a dessert.

Milk will be available for those pupils entitled to free school meals through the free school meal eligibility scheme at morning break or lunchtime.

Pupils in:

- Primary 1 5 receive a free school lunch.
- Primary 6 7 meal cost is £2.00

School lunches and milk can be paid for through your Parentpay account or Paypoint facilities in local shops.

NB: School Meal prices are reviewed annually and may be subject to change.

Special Diets

If your child within Nursery, Primary or Secondary requires a special diet for medical reasons please speak to the school/nursery office who will provide the request form for you to complete. In addition, if you have a cultural diet request for your child please speak o the school/nursery office who will provide you with the request form.

Free school meals

Children of parents who receive the following benefits are entitled to a free lunchtime meal for their child

• Income Support, Universal Credit (where your take home pay is less than £660 per month), (Income-based) Job Seeker's Allowance, Employment and Support Allowance (income related), Working Tax Credit and Child Tax Credit (where your gross annual income does not exceed £7,920, as assessed by the HM Revenues and Customs) and Child Tax Credit only (where your gross annual income does not exceed £17,105 as assessed by the HM Revenues and Customs) or receive support under Part V1 of the immigration and Asylum Act 1999.

If you are in receipt of Housing Benefit and/or Council Tax Reduction from us there is no need for you to apply online, we will use the information we hold to automatically award free school meals (P4 to S6) and/or school clothing grants (P1 to S6) to eligible families.

We would encourage parents of children who are in receipt of any of the above benefits to take up this opportunity of having a meal provided for their child when they are at school. Arrangements are in place so that children who receive free meals are not singled out and we encourage all children to remain in school at lunchtime.

South Lanarkshire Council also offers a free Breakfast service; check your child's school for details.

All meals include fresh chilled drinking water and milk will be available for those pupils entitled to free school meals through the free school meals eligibility scheme after morning break or at lunchtime.

Milk is also available for purchase, via Parent Pay, to those pupils wishing to buy each morning.

Please provide your child with a water bottle, which can be filled up at regular, daily intervals from the water fountain.

School uniform

We ask all parents/carers to support the school by encouraging your child(ren) to adhere to the agreed dress code and the wearing of our school uniform. The wearing of a school uniform helps to promote the identity of the school in the local community and helps create an ethos of sharing and pride in the school.

In addition, the wearing of a uniform helps towards increasing the protection of all pupils, paying consideration to the need to be more security conscious in all our schools. The wearing of a uniform helps staff and the pupils to distinguish between who belongs to the school and those who may be visitors. This enables staff to approach and identify visitors more readily and helps in trying to offer a safer environment for pupils and teachers alike.

Equality of opportunity is an important aspect of the life of the school. Any proposals on dress code, and on what constitutes the school uniform, will be the subject of discussion with the Parent Council and, where appropriate, consultation with parents, pupils and staff. There are forms of dress which are unacceptable in all schools such as:

- the wearing of football colours.
- clothing with slogans that may cause offence (anti-religious, symbolism or political slogans).
- clothing which advertises alcohol, tobacco or drugs.
- clothing which can be deemed unsuitable in terms of health and safety such
 as shell suits, combat style clothing, dangling earrings, loose fitting clothes particularly in
 practical classes.
- articles of clothing that could be deemed to inflict damage on other pupils or be used by others to do so.
- footwear that may damage flooring.

INFORMATION POINT: Leadhills Primary School colours are red and navy. Orders can be made via the school office, at given times throughout the school year.

ParentPay

ParentPay is a web based application that provides a facility for parents to pay online for school meals, trips, music tuition etc. The system was introduced successfully as a pilot in South

Lanarkshire in 2015 and will start to be rolled out across all schools and Council-run nurseries from Spring 2018. The rollout will start in Lesmahagow, Strathaven, Carluke and Lanark Learning Communities before summer 2018 and remaining learning communities/schools will go live in phases over the following 18 months. Parents will be notified by their child's school directly when ParentPay is available for use and with details of how to register.

Why online payments?

Parents will benefit from being able to make online payments for schools meals, trips and activities, early years payments, privilege transport, music tuition and uniforms, and more, using a secure website at any time that is convenient. Parents can view transactions online and see running balances for larger value items such as residential trips. Parents can make payments for all their children (at SLC schools) via a single login. They no longer have to rely on their children to take cash into schools.

Parents who wish to continue to use cash will be able to take advantage of Paypoint facilities in local shops, rather than send their child to school with money.

Schools benefit from using ParentPay in a number of ways including reduced cash handling and banking, and reducing the risks around money being held on school premises. There is improved communication with parents concerning payments, and an accurate record is held of all payments made. Schools have the ability to setup online shops for sale of uniforms etc. There are improved processes for choosing meals in primary schools, and ParentPay integrates with the cashless meals systems in high schools. ParentPay is automatically updated with free meal entitlement.

Allergies

A significant number of children and young people in our schools will have allergies and it is important that parents keep the school fully informed on these matters.

Allergies can present in a variety of ways and can occur at any point in a person's life. Symptoms range from mild to severe. Children and young people known to have an allergy with moderate to severe symptoms will likely have a Health Care Plan drawn up by the NHS. This will detail symptoms and appropriate interventions.

It is vital that parents share this information with the school and continue to provide any updated information.

Where symptoms are mild and a Health Care Plan is not in place, parents should still continue to liaise regularly with the school on any new triggers, medications and actions required.

In all cases, our employees need to know your child's symptoms, treatments and any actions required to help prevent exposure to the allergen and minimise the risk of allergic reactions.

Employees in schools will receive training on allergies and will liaise with parents and NHS on any additional specialist training required.

In supporting children and young people with allergies, school employees will operate in accordance with South Lanarkshire Council's Safe Systems of Work / risk assessment and national guidance on the administration of medicines.

Support for parents/carers

Clothing Grant

In certain circumstances, the Council provides support to parents/carers for the purchase of school wear. We would encourage families, if they are eligible, to apply for these benefits.

Applications can be made online at www.southlanarkshire.gov.uk .If you are required to submit evidence of your Tax Credit income it is important that a copy of this evidence is attached to your online application. Should you require further information, or you are unable to submit an application online then please contact the helpline number 0303 123 1011 (option 5).

Enrolment - how to register your child for school

To register your child for school you should complete our online registration form. This can be done using the South Lanarkshire website.

If you have any difficulty in identifying your catchment school, please email Edsuppserv.helpline@southlanarkshire.gov.uk

The online registration form will ask you to provide each child's full birth certificate and two pieces of recent official documentation both containing your permanent home address for example a utility bill, council tax statement, housing rent card, child benefit documentation.

Proof of where the child lives may also be needed.

Parents within the catchment area will be advised via social media that they can begin using the online registration form to enrol their child for school in August 2023. The registration form along with the child's full birth certificate and 2 proofs of residency will be sent directly to the office email address will be available from 9 January 2023.

If your child attends nursery of your catchment school don't assume that they will be automatically transferred. You must register them as normal.

If your child is starting school for the first time you must enrol your child at their catchment school in January. If parents want their child to go to another school, they must enrol in the first instance with their catchment school and ask for an information leaflet that provides details on how to make a placing request.

Enrolment date for 2022 is week commencing 16 January 2022.

Transport

School transport

South Lanarkshire Council has a policy of providing school transport to primary pupils who live more than one mile by the recognised shortest walking route from their catchment school. This policy is more generous than the law requires. This means that the provision of transport could be reviewed at any time. Parents who consider they are eligible should complete a form online www.southlanarkshire.gov.uk or contact 0303 123 1023.

These forms should be completed and returned before the end of March for those pupils starting the school in August to enable the appropriate arrangements to be made. Applications may be submitted at any time throughout the year and will be considered by Education Resources.

A privilege transport scheme is operated for mainstream school contracts where a pupil is not entitled to free school transport. Privilege transport will only be granted providing there is spare capacity on an existing school contract and will be from and to designated pick up and drop off points. Privilege transport will not be provided where a service bus is used on the school run. Any spare capacity will be allocated using agreed priorities. Pick-up points

Where school transport is provided, it may be necessary for pupils to walk a certain distance to the vehicle pick-up point. Walking distance in total, including the distance from home to the pick-up point and from the drop-off point to the school in any one direction, will not exceed the authority's distance limit for school transport.

It should be noted that it is the parent's responsibility to ensure their child behaves in a safe and acceptable manner while travelling in and alighting from the vehicle. Misbehaviour can result in your child losing the right to school transport.

Parents are asked to note that South Lanarkshire Council does not provide transport for those pupils who attend school via a placing request.

Any information on transport appropriate to the school should mentioned.

Insurance for schools – pupils' personal effects

South Lanarkshire Council is concerned at the level of claims being received for loss or damage to pupils' clothing or personal effects. Parents are asked to note the Council's position in terms of insurance for pupils' personal effects:

(i) Theft/loss of personal effects

The Council is not liable for the loss or theft of pupils' clothing or personal effects and any items are therefore brought into the school at the pupil/parents' own risk.

Parents can assist by ensuring that valuable items and unnecessarily expensive items of clothing are not brought to school.

Teachers and other staff have been advised not to accept custody of any such items.

The same principle applies to musical instruments and other equipment used for activities within the school, which belong to the pupil, but are brought into the school. Parents should be aware that if such equipment is left in school, it is done at the pupil/parents' own risk.

In the case of valuable items such as musical instruments, parents should ensure that these items are covered by their own household insurance.

(ii) Damage to clothing

The Council is only liable for damage caused to pupils' clothing where the damage has resulted from the negligence of the Council or one of its employees. Claims arising otherwise will not be accepted by the Council's insurers.

Family holidays during term time

Every effort should be made to ensure that your child attends school during term time. Please contact the school as soon as possible if your child is unable to attend school.

Family holidays should be avoided during term time as this both disrupts the child's education and reduces learning time. If holidays are taken during times when the school is open, parents should inform the school in advance by letter.

If your child is taken on a family holiday during term time then, in line with Scottish Government advice, this will be classified as an unauthorised absence. However, in exceptional circumstances, schools may register a family holiday during term time as an authorised absence when, for example, parents are unable to obtain leave during the school holiday period. Clearly, absence with no explanation from parents will mean that the absence will be recorded as unauthorised.

In our approach to raising attainment and achievement, it is recognised that attendance at school is something that should be continuously encouraged. Parents/carers, children and the school all have a part to play in encouraging and stressing the importance of attendance at school.

Promoting positive behaviour

It is the responsibility of staff within the school to ensure that parent council members, parents and pupils are involved in the creation of a positive school ethos that encourages good behaviour. Equally, the school whilst trying to promote positive behaviour must support young people should incidents or bullying occur. Parents have a significant role to play in working with the school so that teachers, parents and pupils know what is expected of them in trying to change the behaviour and attitudes that contribute to bullying behaviour.

Our approach is to create an environment where better behaviour will encourage better learning. The school, along with the support of parents, can work together to create a learning environment which young people can enjoy and feel safe.

Incidents of bullying should be reported to the school immediately so that each alleged incident can be looked at. Together we can work towards creating a safer school for children and staff.

In addition, a guideline (Promoting Positive Relationships and Behaviour) has been produced to support all teaching and support staff and inform them of their roles and responsibilities in respect of dealing with the small number of children and young people who display challenging behaviour. Early identification is crucial so that intervention can be provided to support children and young people to help them address their issues and concerns. Staff training is provided to help develop the skills needed to respond to and manage challenging behaviour. A wide range of appropriate staff development opportunities has been developed for this purpose.

Child Protection

All staff in educational establishments in South Lanarkshire Council receive an annual Child Protection update and are required to follow the advice and guidance contained within relevant the Education Operating Procedures. They must also complete a mandatory Learn on Line Course "Child Protection in Education".

South Lanarkshire's children's services partnership works together to support children, young people and their families so that children grow up in communities where they are safe, healthy, active, achieving, respected, responsible and included, and have the opportunity to achieve their full potential. They are committed to continuously improve our services to ensure children, young people and their families get the right support at the right time.

Sometimes children and young people need additional help to make sure that they are "cared for and protected from abuse and harm in a safe environment in which their rights are respected" (CPC South Lanarkshire Child Protection shared vision). The Child Protection Committee has the overarching responsibility to ensure that agencies individually and collectively work to protect children and young people as effectively as possible.

All staff have a responsibility to report any suspicions that a child has been abused or is at risk of harm, abuse, or neglect. Robust procedures and guidance are in place to support education staff to:-

- be alert to signs that a child may be experiencing risks to their wellbeing,
- report concerns to the head of establishment or the child protection coordinator without delay.
- be actively engaged in support and protection and development of wellbeing.

If you would like more information or have a concern of a child protection nature, please contact the head of the educational establishment which your child attends.

Information on emergencies

We make every effort to ensure the school remains open during term-time for pupils. However, on occasions circumstances may arise which can affect the school. Schools may be affected by, for example, severe weather, power failures or through any other circumstances that may impact on the school day. In such cases we shall do all we can to let you know if this happens. We shall keep you in touch by phone, text, where appropriate, letters, web news and through local radio stations particularly if there are prolonged periods of severe weather. The Council's website www.southlanarkshire.gov.uk will be used to let you know if the school is closed and when it will reopen.

It is important for parents/carers to let the school know of any change to your mobile/home phone number and change of address.

General Data Protection Regulation as supplemented by the Data Protection Act 208 (GDPR)

Information on pupils, parents and guardians is held by the school to enable the teaching, registration and assessment of pupils as well as associated administrative duties. The information is stored and used as per the requirements of the Data Protection Act 1998 with South Lanarkshire Council defined as the data controller. Privacy Notice

Introduction

In line with the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) we have produced this privacy notice to inform you how we deal with personal information as part of our statutory function as an education authority.

The Council has a legal obligation to deliver effective education services to children, young people and adult learners in South Lanarkshire. In order to do this we need to collect personal information about children, young people and their families so that we can help them to learn and keep them safe.

Using your personal information

The Council is a "controller" of the personal information you provide when enrolling for a nursery or school, applying for an education service or participating in groups or activities provided by Education Resources.

Information we collect from you about you and your child at enrolment

When you enrol for a nursery or school, we ask for the following information:

- parent/carer contact details (name, address, phone, email);
- the child's name, date of birth, gender and address;
- · information about medical conditions, additional support needs, religion and ethnicity;
- · any information you may wish to provide about family circumstances.

Information we collect at other times

We will also collect information at other times such as when you apply for a benefit, request a services or other support. We will provide an additional privacy notice at these times.

- · If you apply for an education service or benefit, such as school transport, free school meals, clothing grant, placing request or EMA, we will also ask for personal information as set out above. We will also ask for information about your income for education benefits applications.
- · If you make a request for additional support such as an educational psychologist or other support for learning we will ask for more detailed information to allow us to provide the most appropriate support for your family. This may include information about family circumstances or medical conditions.
- · If there are concerns about your child's wellbeing and/or your child has needs that may require additional support, we will wish to work with you to collect and consider information to enable us to help you get the right support at the right time in line with the Getting it right for every child approach.

We require this information to ensure that children and young people are educated appropriately, supported, and that we take account of their health and wellbeing. We will also ask you to update this information annually and to tell us when there are changes to your details.

Information that we collect from other sources

As an education authority and as part of our statutory function in accordance with our legal obligations, we receive information from other sources such as the SQA, the NHS or Social Work about you or your child, this includes:

- exam results and assessment information;
- · information about health, wellbeing or child protection.

Why do we need this information?

We need this information so the Council can ensure it is delivering education services appropriately to all learners:

· for the education of children, young people and adult learners;

- · for teaching, enrolment and assessment purposes and to monitor the educational progress of children, young people and adult learners;
- · to keep children and young people safe and provide guidance services in school;
- to identify where additional support is needed to help children, young people and adult learners with their learning;
- to maintain records of attendance, absence and behaviour of children and young people (including exclusions);
- to support children and young people moving on each year from nursery to primary, primary to secondary and when they move or leave school;
- · to help us develop and improve education services provided for young people, adult learners or families
- · In accordance with our legitimate interests as an education authority we will also use your information to create statistical reports.

We will share your information with:

As an education authority and as part of our statutory function in accordance with our legal obligations we will share information with other bodies or parts of the Council, including:

- · The Scottish Government and bodies such as Education Scotland, Scottish Qualifications Authority, Skills Development Scotland and other organisations that support children and young people's learning;
- · Other parts of the Council when required for services such as school meals, school transport, education benefits and with Social work in connection with any child protection concerns we become aware of;
- The NHS, to support health initiatives in accordance with the legal obligation on the Council in terms of section 39(3) of the National Health Service (Scotland Act 1978;
- · South Lanarkshire Leisure and Culture Limited, where children and young people are participating in sports and leisure activities;
- · Other schools/local authorities if a child moves or transfers to another school the Council has an obligation to pass on information with regards to pupil records to the new school/local authority.

You have the right to access your personal information as well as the rights of rectification, erasure, restriction and the right to object.
