Our Parent Council contribute enthusiastically to many aspects of school life. They supported our very successful Christmas Fayre. They are planning Valentine's discos on Friday 14th February. Attendance and Punctuality

Article 28 from the United Nations Convention of the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) states that:


Every Child has the right to an education.



One way Neilsland Primary implements this article is through closely monitoring punctuality and attendance. Our aim for this academic year is to have an attendance rate of 95%. The school has a **responsibility to monitor attendance closely** and when a child's attendance falls below 90%, we will make contact with parents/carers to discuss the reasons for this and to provide support to improve a child's attendance at school.

If a child's attendance falls under 90%, letters will be sent home and follow-up phone calls will be made. Over the next month, the school will be looking again at sending further letters home if your child's attendance has fallen below 90% or if there has been limited improvement in attendance. If there has not been an improvement in a child's attendance the school will implement the next stage of South Lanarkshire Council's attendance procedures. Our current attendance as a school is: **94.1%**

We recently sent out the poster below as part of a Calderside Learning Community approach towards the promotion of excellent attendance.



The following table shows the number of children who have been late for school on a monthly basis this session.

We also count the number of times each child is late within a month and we keep a running total of this. From August '24 to December '24 the school recorded **225 lates**. This information is passed onto South Lanarkshire Council.

Easter Fun Day






Extra Curricular Clubs

P6 Euroquiz

Some of our P6 pupils will be taking part in P6 Euroquiz at Newton Farm Primary School on Thursday 20th March. Euroquiz is an annual project open to all P6 pupils across Scotland, which sees teams of four working together to broaden their knowledge of Europe and the wider world. Subjects covered include languages, history, geography, culture and European affairs. Heats take place in from February to March, with the winning teams progressing to the National Euroquiz Final in June.

Online Safety

We often send out an email to all parents/carers regarding online safety

In the interest of pupil online safety, I would ask you to have an "MOT" of your young person's online presence, if they have one, as soon as you can possibly do so. (WhatsApp, Instagram, Snapchat, Tik Tok)

It has come to our attention that several of our pupils have been engaging in an inappropriate and offensive manner online.

At the same time I would also ask you to have a serious discussion with them about making sure any posts they make are both legally and morally responsible.

This continues to be an issue. I urge all parents/carers to check their child's phone/technology.

Maths Fluid Groupings

Priority 1 of the school's improvement plan is to increase attainment in numeracy. All staff have participated in training in implementing 'Fluid Groupings' and we have been visited by the Development Officer (Gillian Gray) from South Lanarkshire Council to support our school further with this journey. Fluid groupings is a teaching strategy that provides opportunities for children to challenge themselves in maths. The teacher will teach the maths concept using a range of resources and the children select their follow-up challenge i.e. Silver, Gold, Platinum or Titanium. Mrs Gray has loved her visits to our school and she has been impressed by how engaged our children are in their maths work.

The children are loving this way of teaching and learning as they have the opportunity to personalise their own learning and from early assessments it is having a positive impact on attainment.

You+Me Multiply Parents/Carers Workshops

We are delighted to be running another set of You+Me Multiply workshops for parents/carers this term. The workshops have a maths focus where Mrs White and Mrs Marnie discuss how place value, addition and subtraction and multiplication and division is taught in our classes. In addition, they show games that can be used to practise the maths concept.



United Nations Convention of the Rights of the Child (UNCRC)

During the inset day in November, all staff engaged in South Lanarkshire Council (SLC) training on the implementation the UNCRC articles. Further training will take place during the February inset day to extend our knowledge of the 54 articles. This is a key priority for our school and we openly discuss the articles with our children on a daily basis. Each class has created a 'Class Charter' and this underpins the classroom ethos. During this term, Mrs Marnie's assemblies will focus on the following rights:

Children's Mental Health Awareness Week

Children's Mental Health Awareness Week takes place from 3rd – 7th February. Mrs Mark and Miss May have organised a series of activities for all pupils over the course of the week to support mental health and wellbeing including a visit from ST PHNX, biscuit and blether stations, yoga and mindfulness,

Basketball Tournament

Some of our P6 and P7 pupils will take part in a basketball tournament with St. Peter's Primary School. We link with St. Peter's for various events over the course of the session and value our strong partnership. We attend one another's class assemblies, have a football tournament organised for later in the session and are joining up to celebrate World Book Day in March.

P7 transition

Transition for our P7 pupils is fully underway. There have been several visits from Calderside Academy teachers to work with the class. There was an open evening for pupils and parents prior to Christmas and some of our P7 pupils have taken part in a writing programme with Mrs Reid from Calderside. The Primary Ambassadors have also visited a couple of times and Mrs Calder, the HT at Calderside, offered a drop in session for pupils parents after school in November. A UNCRC transition event for all P7 pupils within Calderside Learning Community is currently being planned. It will take place on **Monday 24th March**.

Hazel Kelly, a Youth Family and Community Learning worker will also be coming in to work with our P7 pupils, delivering workshops to support transition to high school.



Sustainability Day

Our Eco Committee are planning a sustainability day on **Thursday 20th March**. They will plan a variety of lessons and activities which they will implement with all classes over the course of the day.

Attachment Accreditation

We are delighted to announce that we have successfully achieved our **fourth pledge** 'Recognise Behaviour as Communication' through South Lanarkshire Council's Attachment Accreditation Process.

The Education Resources Attachment Strategy was launched in March 2019.

The aim of the strategy is to promote better experiences of attachment for South Lanarkshire's children and young people and to ensure that all education practitioners understand how positive relationships can make a difference to outcomes.

Equity Update

Foodbank

The Pupil Council and Mrs Marnie met last week to discuss how best this money could be used and together they decided to use the money to purchase additional ICT and playground equipment. They are currently looking at additional ipads or chromebooks for class.


