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1. Introduction by Head Teacher

Dear parent/carers,

At Udston Primary School we value the importance of strong partnership working between home and school to support pupils and improve outcomes for our children. One key aspect of this is working in partnership to support home learning provided by the school and your child's class teacher. This allows parents to be fully informed and have the necessary information to consolidate and extend their child's learning at home.

We recognise that all families are unique and many parents and carers have varying views about the importance of homework and balancing this with busy family lives. We wish to provide a structured but flexible approach to homework that enhances the work done in the classroom. As a school we strongly value reading and the impact that this can have on other areas of the curriculum – and we would promote this all stages of your child's educational journey.

Home learning provides an opportunity to practise and apply skills in different contexts and provides information for parents about their child's progress in learning. Each child's progress is reviewed through class-based learning activities rather than the teacher marking home learning activities.

We have also included a list of suitable websites that can support and enhance pupil learning at home.

2. Rationale

Purpose of Homework

Whilst we believe strongly that the purpose of homework at Udston Primary School is to support and reinforce current learning in class, it is important that this is manageable, achievable and supports the learning in class. Parents and carers can make a huge difference to their child's attainment by providing opportunities at home to practise and consolidate skills learnt in numeracy and literacy. This Partnership approach to homework also gives children regular opportunities to discuss learning at home, alongside keeping parents and carers informed about current learning in school.

Homework can play a positive role in raising a child's level of attainment and independence. We also acknowledge the importance of role play and free time in a child's growth and development. While homework is important, it should not prevent children from taking part in the wide range of out-of-school clubs and organisations that play an important part in the lives of many children.

What should homework look like?


Homework should never be onerous and will only be assigned to children once an appropriate amount of learning has taken place in class first. In line with The Scottish Government, we believe that quality homework (short, achievable tasks) is more important than quantity. Homework should:

- help and encourage independent learning.
- promote a partnership between home and school in supporting each child's learning.
- consolidate and reinforce learning done in school and to allow children to practise skills taught in lessons.
- help children develop good work habits for the future.
- provide a contact for pupil/parent interaction.
- help parents gain an insight into their child's schoolwork.


Background to Homework Rationale

The Senior Leadership Team have now canvassed the views of parents/carers and staff on 2 occasions. This took the format of surveys before Covid-19 and more recently at the October parent/carer meetings. On both occasions it was evident that parents and staff have strong opinions on both sides, so we want to listen to all views and move forward with a balanced approach. The homework rationale should provide clarity and structure to homework provided for each stage throughout the school. It was clear that homework was still important to all, but this should be streamlined to fit the context of our families.


These are the results from the most recent survey:

In some classes, a sharing the learning session will take place in class to celebrate and share pictures etc.

What is the role of the teacher?

The role of the teacher is to assign appropriate, achievable homework tasks for your child. The class teacher will go over all tasks assigned and check for understanding before homework is issued. A homework jotter will be issued where required.

Children are assessed in class through teacher observation and application of learning. Home learning activities are not formally marked and returned to parents in the majority of classes. Time is used instead to plan meaningful, high quality learning experiences during the school day.

What is the role of the parent?

All work is uploaded to **Google Classroom**. As a parent or carer, you should ensure that you have the appropriate log in to access Google Classroom. Please contact Mrs Drennan if you have any technical issues (aw07drennansusan01@glow.sch.uk)

You should ensure that your child has a quiet, comfortable space to complete their homework tasks. If your child has access to the Internet, you should also support them with accessing Google Classroom online.

What is the role of the pupil?

To complete homework tasks within the allocated time.

To ensure that written work is well presented.

To ensure that homework is submitted as and when requested.

What is the role of the school?

As a school, we are fully committed to supporting all our pupils with their homework tasks. All activities are designed to reinforce and enhance classroom learning. It is our job to ensure that all homework is manageable and relevant for your child's needs. Learning at home should not be onerous, time- consuming or challenging. We seek as a school to encourage pupils to work independently as much as possible to promote confidence and competency.
