**HISTORY: NATIONAL 3/4/5** 

**Why History?** - In History, you develop your understanding of the world by learning about other people and their values, in different times, places and circumstances. You are encouraged to develop important attitudes, including: an open mind and respect for the values, beliefs and cultures of others; openness to new thinking and ideas, and a sense of responsibility and global citizenship.

**Entry to the Course** - The History course will be offered at various levels to suit the learning needs of all pupils. Enthusiasm for the subject is all that is required.

**Course Outline** - You will study three units:

**European and World: World War II, 1939–45** – In this unit, you continue to build on your work in S3. You will consolidate your previous learning about German territorial expansion at the start of the War, the war with Japan in the East and life in occupied Europe. You will also go on to learn about the allied victories in Europe and Japan at the end of the War.

**Scottish: Mary Queen of Scots, and the Reformation, 1542–1587** – This unit builds on the work done in S3 by further looking at this exciting period of Scottish history by learning about the plotting, rebellions, murders and radical change that characterised the nation during the lifetime of Queen Mary.

**British:** The Making of Modern Britain, 1880-1951 – In this unit you will learn about how Britain went from a country where the 30% of the population who lived in poverty were largely blamed for their own situation, to a society in which the government accepted responsibility for ensuring the well-being of its people from 'Cradle to Grave'.

## Assessment -

At National 3 and National 4 there are assessments at the end of each of the three units. At National 4 there is also an assignment which will allow you to apply a range of skills as you research an historical issue.

At National 5 you will write a report on your own research into an historical theme or question of your own choice. This will be marked by the SQA and will form part of the overall grade awarded. There is also an external exam at the end of the year, which will also be used to determine your overall grade, along with the assignment.
