## Literacy – Phonics



Can you be the teacher and teach the adult at home some of your favourite sounds? Remember to tell them the sound it makes and how to write it!

## Literacy – Writing



With help from an adult talk about your learning journey in P1 this year: things you enjoyed or found challenging. Write 2 or 3 sentences about your first year of school.

## Literacy – Reading



Pick some of your favourite stories at home and put on your detective hat. Write down all the tricky words you could find hiding in the book.

## Numeracy and Maths



Practice the days of the week and months of the year. You could make cards and order them.

What different 2D shapes can you find around the house? Can you draw something you found that was a triangle?

Practice writing your numbers from 0-20.

## HWB



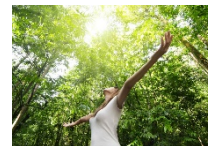
Practice gymnastic rolls including pencil, teddy bear and forward rolls. Make sure you are on a safe carpeted area with plenty of space.

<b>Reading – List of tricky words</b>

<b>Writing</b>
If your child is struggling to sound out words, you can help them practice letter formation by writing it down for them to copy or using a highlighter or light coloured felt tip pen for them to write over with a pencil.
