<p><u>Picnic Time</u></p> <p>Can you set up a Picnic for your family? Can you try and set it up yourself with plates, cups, cutlery? Can you help make and prepare the food you are going to eat?</p>	<p><u>Measuring</u></p> <p>All you need is paper, pen and a ruler or measuring tape. I would like you to draw around one foot / hand of each member of your family including pets etc. Then using a ruler or a measuring tape measure them and write down the size of each. Parents you can ask who has the biggest/smallest/middle sized feet? Can you count how many cm each foot/hand measures. You could also measure your heights to find out how tall each person is.</p>	<p><u>Baking banana bread</u></p> <p>How yummy is banana bread, the ladies in nursery love it! If you don't want to make banana bread you can make something else? Check out the recipe on the next page.....</p>	<p><u>Paper Dolls</u></p> <p>Today we are going to make our own paper dolls. This is a lovely way to discuss and teach young children to be caring and respectful to others. On each doll, write down their ideas when you ask them "How can you be a good friend?" Helpful prompts.....share toys, be kind, read a story See the link to YouTube for instructions below.</p>	<p><u>Paper Plate Alphabet Hunt</u></p> <p>Write the letters of the alphabet around the edge of a paper plate or paper circle and cut between each letter. Head off for your alphabet hunt – indoors or outdoors. Each time you find something that starts with a new letter fold the tab on the plate/circle down until you have found the whole alphabet.</p>
<p><u>Messy Garden</u></p> <p>For this game you will need lots of soft toys or teddies that can be thrown about. Using rope, chalk or a long scarf make a line separating a space into two halves. One or more people stand on each side of the line ready to play. Set a time and try to throw all the toys from your side into the other team's space. Remember not to cross the line. When the times up count how many toys are in your side. Who is the winner?</p>	<p><u>Make Your Own Game</u></p> <p>Today I would like you to create your own game. I have started by drawing 4 different coloured washing lines. I have used blue, red, orange and yellow and I have made t-shirts, trousers and socks out of paper and coloured them these colours. Put the clothes in the middle and take turns to pick one thing out and put it on the correct washing line. You can use this idea or create your own game.</p>	<p><u>Taking Photographs</u></p> <p>Can you become a photographer for the day? Using a phone, tablet or camera take some photos of your daily routine in lockdown. Did you see some birds on a walk? Can your brother, sister, mummy, daddy etc make a funny face? What is your favourite photo that you've taken? Adults you can have a discussion around technology and how it works? What's making the photo happen? Cause and effect?</p>	<p><u>Story Time</u></p> <p>My children have loved this story this afternoon. My son's teacher from P2 shared it with her class. It has invited a lot of discussion and has helped my children understand the current situation a little more . Find the YouTube link below</p> 	<p><u>Make Your Own Story</u></p> <p>Today I would like you to make up your own story. All good stories have a beginning, a middle and an end, so you will need coloured pens and 3 pieces of paper (one for each part of the story). Draw your first picture to start your story. Think about who will be in your story? What will happen? Do the same for the middle – what will happen next? Finally draw your last picture - how does your story end? Tell your story to your family</p>

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Recipe for Banana Bread

You will need:

2 very ripe bananas

2 large eggs

175g caster sugar

225g self-raising flour

1tsp baking powder

2tbsp milk

Heat the oven to 180 degrees

Baking tin – lightly greased.

Put all the ingredients into a bowl, remember to mash the bananas up first, mix together and put into the baking tin.

Bake for an hour.



The Mystery of the Vanishing Socks


The beginning of my story
