<p><u>Monday - Outdoor Learning</u></p> 	<p><u>Tuesday - Early Numeracy</u></p> 	<p><u>Wednesday - STEAM</u></p> 	<p><u>Thursday - Health and Wellbeing</u></p> 	<p><u>Friday - Early Literacy</u></p> 
<p><u>Outdoor Pictures</u></p>  <p>All you need is some paper and the outdoors. Draw a template of your choosing e.g. A dress, car, fairy wings etc. Cut it out so that there is only an outline. Go and explore the outdoors and see what decorations will create your picture.</p>	<p><u>Hopscotch</u></p> <p>All you need for this activity is chalk and some paving stones. Encourage your child to mark make the squares and the numbers inside speaking about the numbers and shapes while doing so. Then take turns doing hopscotch. Ask your child to show siblings/parents how to play. You could also use a paver (lid or something flat) to roll to a number then hopscotch to it.</p>	<p><u>Ice Paints</u></p> <p>You will need an ice cube tray, paint and cocktail sticks. Add a small amount of paint to the bottom of the ice cube tray. Once you have your chosen colours add water to the tray and mix using the cocktail stick. Once mixed leave the cocktail stick in the ice cube tray to act as the paintbrush. Leave overnight in the freezer and use the next day. Have fun!</p>	<p><u>Dancing</u></p> 	<p><u>Magic Letters</u></p> <p>For this activity you will need a white crayon or candle. Ask a grown up to write letters on a piece of white paper using the white crayon/candle. Using very runny paint (you will probably need to water it down) brush over the paper and see which letters appear. Then swap over and you write the letters for your grown up to find (see photos below)</p>
<p><u>Kite making</u></p> <p>Collect a range of items e.g. a polythene bag, paper, stick and some string. Attach the sting to each item and test out which will make the best kite. Or can you be creative and make your own?</p>	<p><u>Number recognition</u></p> <p>My second activity is all about number recognition and quantity. I have made my own counting games - have a look at the photographs below for ideas. For my games I used paper, chalk, pegs and pens. Remember you can ask a grown up for help.</p>	<p><u>Towers</u></p> <p>Can you build a tower using things you can find around your house? Like milk cartons, plastic bottles, cardboard etc. Try and balance your tower and watch it doesn't fall over. You could maybe have a competition with your family to see who can build the highest tower without it falling over. Have a tea party 	<p><u>Sensory Mark Making</u></p> <p>For this activity you will need a plastic tray and some dry sand, a bag of salt, some shaving foam or mud. Choose one messy thing and spread it onto your tray. Now you are ready to get drawing and writing. You can make patterns, shapes, pictures, numbers or letters. Ask a grown up to make a pattern or a word and copy what they have done. Have fun!</p>

Sensory Mark Making



It is important to offer children a variety of mark making opportunities using different media – not just pencil and paper. Not only is this lots of fun, it helps to spark interest and imagination as children develop control and skill learning to draw and write.

Number recognition

- 1) Snowmen – draw and cut out the snowmen then write the numbers on their tummies. To play the game attach the correct number of pegs to each snowman.
- 2) Caterpillars – draw the caterpillar heads and write the numbers at the side. To play the game draw the correct number of spots or add counters.
- 3) Flowers – draw the flower centres and stems then add the numbers into the middle. To play the game draw the correct number of petals on each flower.
