

Money

Practise paying for items with 'Cashing In'.
Work with coins up to 10p.

Subtraction Race

Each player will need a tower of 20 Lego bricks. Both players start at the same time, rolling a dice and taking away that number of bricks from their tower. The first person to get rid of their whole tower is the winner.

Counting

Continue counting both forwards and backwards to at least 30. Try going up and down the stairs counting forwards as you go up and backwards as you go down. You can make this trickier by changing the starting number e.g. 20 on the bottom step.

Adding Doubles

Make a doubles matching game - draw ladybirds with double spots on some cards and the totals on others. Can you match them up? You can turn all the cards over and play pairs with them.

Write numbers 1 to 20 on pieces of paper. Set a timer and see how long it takes you to put them in the right order. Try to beat your previous score each time you try it. You can start a leaderboard of times with the people in your house.

Number Groupings

Choose ten small items and put them in two groups. Write a number sentence for this e.g. $8+2=10$. How many different groupings can you come up with? Children should be very familiar with grouping 10 items. Repeat the activity with 6, 7, 8 and 9 items.

Subtraction Race

Each player will need a tower of 30 Lego bricks. Both players start at the same time, rolling a dice and taking away that number of bricks from their tower. Count backwards as you take each brick away. The first person to get rid of their whole tower is the winner.

Counting

Continue counting both forwards and backwards within 100. Try going up and down the stairs counting forwards as you go up and backwards as you go down. Change the start number each time. For example, the bottom step might be 30, or the top step 80.

Make a doubles matching game - draw ladybirds with double spots on some cards and the totals on others. Can you match them up? You can turn all the cards over and play pairs with them.

Phonics and Spelling - 25.05.20

Sprinkle a surface in your kitchen with flour. Take it in turns to ask and spell your words in the flour using your finger.

Practise your spelling words a few times until you are familiar with them. Then write them out with the letters scrambled up. Can you unscramble them again the next day?

Continue to progress through the stages of teaching your monster how to read. This is a great site for phonics practise.
