• Successful Learners

Language learning has positive benefits and can enhance cognitive and linguistic development.

Confident Individuals

Our children will be able to confidently deliver presentations in another language and will be more able to converse with other nationalities on a personal level.



• Effective Contributors

Pupils will be able to enhance their interpersonal skills by working individually or alongside others on the target language.

• Responsible Citizens

Our children will increase their awareness of other cultures and have a better understanding of their own. This awareness will open doors for our young people and increase their awareness of the globalised world we live in



What does this mean for pupils and teachers?

Language learning is life enhancing, culturally enriching and part of being a global citizen. The Curriculum for Excellence states that by 2020 all children in Scotland will learn a modern language from Primary 1 (L2) and then start to learn another language (L3) from Primary 5.

All teachers will be involved in language teaching and there will be many opportunities to enhance teaching skills through training courses. The foreign language will be embedded in classroom routines such as reciting the day and date in L2 and responding appropriately to classroom instructions. The entitlement of every young person to learn a modern language will continue to at least third level, which for most learners will mean until the end of S3.

Why is this happening now?
