English & Literacy

This term, P6 will be continuing our guided reading lessons focusing on developing reading skills for fiction texts. Alongside this, we will be reading play scripts and studying how authors and directors create a setting in fictional books and films, linking to our Alice in Wonderland IDL context. This will lead to creating our own play scripts and describing settings during writing lessons. Pupils will have many opportunities to develop their talking and listening skills. There will be a large focus on explaining and justifying preferences about texts and, whilst practising for our show, we will be working on communicating with expression and clarity.

Maths & Numeracy

This term, P6 will be learning about a range of addition and subtraction strategies, both mental and written. This will be supported by our Number Talks sessions where we look at finding efficient strategies for mental calculations. Also, we will extend our understanding of place value by learning about decimals. Alongside this, we will spend some time on an 'Alice in Numberland' topic focusing on a variety of problem solving challenges. These activities will require pupils to apply a variety of mathematical skills.
