Yesterday you went on a Minibeast Hunt. I wonder what you found?

Imagine if you were the size of a garden minibeast.

What would the garden be like for you?

Everything around you would be so big and so noisy.

Draw a picture of a garden with things like grass, flowers, a tree, a flowerpot, or garden tools. Make them BIG and clear. You can add other things too, like a bird, a ladybird, a bumble bee or a butterfly.

Now draw yourself in the picture too – remember your size!

Are you hiding under a leaf? or Watching a worm slither by? or Sheltering beside a daisy?

Ask a grown up to help you label the things in your picture (nouns). Add any adjectives or verbs that you might need to describe the garden or the ladybird.

Now you're ready to write about your adventure.

Remember to include **WHO WHERE** and **WHAT** in your story.

• Spelling

- Try building your words using playdough, or little stones, or pasta shapes
- Or make a hopscotch grid and practise your words outside in the sunshine.
- Or spell your words out loud as you play a game of throw and catch with a ball
- Or spell the words as you skip.
- Or fill a squeezy water bottle, go into the garden and try writing your words on the path or on a wall. (Check with a grown up first!)

<u>Take Your Pencil For A Walk</u>

What you need

A pencil Plain paper Pens, colouring pencils,

What to do

Put the pencil to the paper and begin to draw a randomly moving continuous line, without taking the pencil off the paper until it is covered with lines, swirls and shapes.

You can do this with smooth, curved lines, straight, jagged lines or a mixture of both.

Now colour the shapes that you have made. This is most effective with felt-tip pens.

Try creating tiny or large patterns.

Take your work outside and make the patterns on the path with chalk.
