Objects of Reference

What is an Object of Reference?

An Object of Reference is simply an object that stands for or names a certain place, activity, event or person. Below is a list of examples:

Object of Reference	Meaning
Spoon	Dinner time
Part of a seat belt	Bus or car
Bracelet	Staff member or carer

Who uses Objects of Reference?

Objects of Reference are used with a wide range of people who need extra clues about what will happen next.

Why use Objects of Reference?

- Objects of Reference are useful because we can hold, smell and touch them.
- Objects of Reference are related to the activity / person/ place which means it can help the service user guess.
- The objects used are chosen to suit the person's likes and experiences.

Choosing the right object

- Firstly, choose what the object of reference is going to be for; e.g. are they to help the service user with their daily routines or is it to help them with the people they meet.
- 2. For each message pick an object that is specific for the service user.
- 3. Before the activity is carried out or the person approaches give the object to the service user.
- 4. Encourage the service user to feel and explore the object.
- 5. Tell the service user what the object means e.g. "it's dinner time.... Can you hold the spoon for dinner time?"
- 6. As soon as the service user has explored the object introduce the activity or person.

Tips

Always use the same object for a specific message. If it gets lost, get an exact copy.
