(Children will know which spellings they normally do)

1. **ast spellings (continued): blast, cast, castle, fast, last, mast, nasty, past**
2. **ing spellings: bring, cling, fling, king, ring, sing, sling, sting, swing**
3. **oy spellings: boy, coy, joy, enjoy, toy, ahoy, employ**
4. (you have now completed level 4 spellings so we will now go on to some 'common exception words') early, earth, eight, eighth, enough, exercise, experience, extreme


2. Go to 'My class log in' Username: P3Uphall Password: hello

5. Read the book and answer the comprehension questions on the front page.

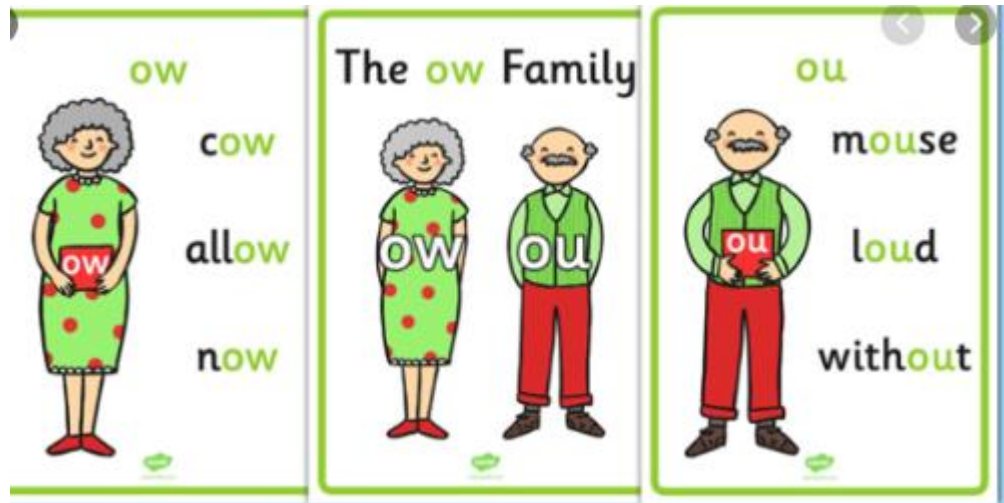

<p>Mystery</p> <p>A fictional story that revolves around dealing with a puzzling crime or discovering a secret.</p> 	<p>Folktale</p> <p>A story or belief, often passed on by word of mouth, with exaggerated characters and obstacles.</p> 	<p>Fable</p> <p>A short story, that often teaches a moral, typically with animals as characters.</p> 	<p>Information</p> <p>A non-fictional writing or story that is about a specific topic.</p> 	
<p>Legend</p> <p>A story that is based on an event or a person, but cannot be proven.</p> 	<p>Fairy Tale</p> <p>A story that typically involves magical forces and unlikely events that lead to a happy ending.</p> 	<p>Myth</p> <p>A traditional story, that normally involves supernatural events or beings, explaining a natural or social phenomenon.</p> 	<p>Fantasy</p> <p>A fictional story that is very imaginative and uses very strange characters or settings.</p> 	
<p>Poetry</p> <p>A choice of words which uses sound and rhythm to inspire thoughts and feelings.</p> 	<p>Historical Fiction</p> <p>A literary genre in which the plot takes place in a setting located in the past.</p> 	<p>Biography</p> <p>A story about a real person's life that is written by someone else.</p> 	<p>Autobiography</p> <p>A story about a real person's life that is written by himself or herself.</p> 	<p>Science Fiction</p> <p>A story, that includes science and technology, often set in the future or other worlds.</p>
